## 2019 Kentucky Bluegrass Wine Auction & Derby Gala



**The fourteenth annual Kentucky Bluegrass Wine Auction & Derby Gala was held on Thursday, May 2, 2019 at the beautiful Donamire Farm in Lexington, Kentucky.**

Over 560 guests attended this elegant charity wine auction just days before the 145th running of the Kentucky Derby. The event had the distinct honor of having Linda and Jerry Bruckheimer as the 2019 Auction Chairs along with the pleasure of having Jack Bittner, Managing Partner of OVID. Napa Valley as

Vintner Chair. Our entry tent was graciously designed by the talents of Jon Carloftis Fine Gardens and a delicious meal was prepared by Apiary Fine Catering. To date, this fast growing event has raised over \$16.5 million to benefit The Lexington Cancer Foundation's (LCF's) mission to improve the lives of cancer patients and their families.

Exclusive live auction lots included: the Italian trip of a lifetime with Monteverdi Tuscany; a South African safari; BottleRock Napa Valley by Live Nation Arenas; a Zachys and Memento Mori wine dinner at Daniel in NYC; VIP McLaren Formula 1 United States Grand Prix with flight time by NetJets; and a rare Pappy Van Winkle collection and overnight stay along with tasting with Master Distiller Harlen Wheatley and President Julian Van Winkle, just to name a few.

Over \$130,000 was raised by a surprise lot offered by University of Kentucky coaches – John Calipari, Mark Stoops and Matthew Mitchell. The trio were quite entertaining on stage, pooling together four lower arena season tickets for Men's and Women's basketball and football. A moving moment was when Kentucky football offensive line coach, John Schlarman, was called onstage to talk about his cancer journey.

The silent auction lots featured many fine and rare wines for enthusiasts, including new wineries not yet featured at the event. Lots included OVID. Napa Valley magnums, Arkenstone Estate Winery, St. Supéry Dollarhide Ranch Adventure, Maker's Mark private tour and tasting and more.

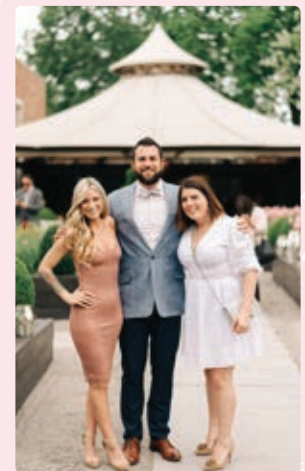

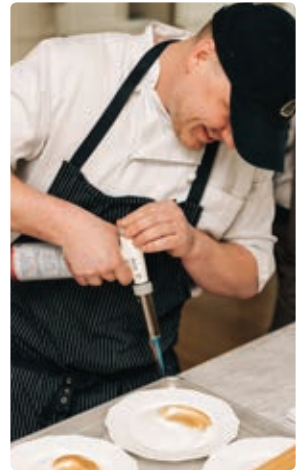

## LCF Patron Stories



### Steve and Diana Abbott: Our Story

My name is Steve Abbott and along with my company Monteverdi Tuscany, I am a proud supporter of LCF.

In July 2013, after my friend Rob passed away from lymphoma at the age of 43, I scheduled a variety of doctor's visits, some of which I was overdue for at the time. My father had previously been diagnosed with prostate cancer, and I was strongly advised to begin annual PSA screenings at age 50. I scheduled an appointment with a urologist only to learn that I already had an asymptomatic case of advanced prostate cancer. Many treatments later, my cancer is metastatic and incurable, yet I maintain hope due to the work being done by cancer charities like LCF and the research being done in laboratories and clinical trials around the world.

Shortly after my diagnosis, my wife Diana was diagnosed with a triple negative, invasive ductal carcinoma; an aggressive form of breast cancer. At that point, we switched caregiver roles. She had 16 chemotherapy and 30 radiation treatments over the course of a (long) year but thankfully, she is recurrence-free four years following the conclusion of her treatment.

During this time, we have celebrated remissions and cures with fellow patients, and wept with the families of others that have been lost to this hideous disease. We support organizations like LCF because Diana and I see a future where cancer will either be curable or, at worst, a chronic, treatable disease. This dream can be a reality due to organizations like LCF and other cancer charities.



### Leslie Keller-Biehl: My Story

I am grateful for the free Jin Shin Jyutsu at UK Markey Center with Jennifer Bradley, provided through funding from LCF.

I started my ovarian cancer journey about 18 months ago. Calming the mind and body are very important in managing stress when you have cancer. It is also helpful for pain management. Jennifer, along with the staff at UK Integrative Medicine & Health, is phenomenal. I was experiencing very painful mouth sores from my chemo treatment and she shared with me techniques to help with the pain. As the development manager for LexArts, I need the use of my voice. I talk a lot!

Occasionally I will have an upset stomach from the supplements I need to take. Following some of the techniques Jennifer has taught me have helped to lessen those issues. I recently was having pain between my ribs—not sure if it was from a spill on my bike, or something else. After seeing Jennifer, the pain IS GONE!

Cancer creates a financial burden. There are many things insurance does not cover, like supplements, nutrition and alternative healing treatments. These can cost over \$500 a month. Thank you for making this accessible to everyone!

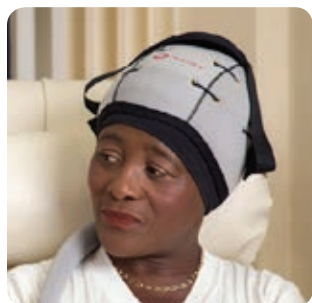

# LCF Grant Funded Spotlight: Baptist Health Lexington Cancer Center

When our patients are made aware they will be receiving chemotherapy treatment, one of the first questions they often ask is, “Will I lose my hair?” Until recently, the only option was to hope that by some miracle the amount of hair loss would be less than most people experience.



A cancer diagnosis is both terrifying and life-changing, and its full impact is not realized all at once. Rather, the many and varied effects of cancer are revealed over time, from the physical impact of the disease and treatment to the emotional and financial effects of the cancer journey.



At Baptist Health Lexington, we treat over 1500 patients each year with a variety of treatment modalities, among the most common being chemotherapy infusion. When our patients are made aware they will be receiving

chemotherapy treatment, one of the first questions they often ask is, “Will I lose my hair?” This is because treatment-related hair loss is often cited as one of the most devastating aspects of the cancer journey for many survivors. Until recently, for the treatments that cause hair loss, the only option was to hope that by some miracle the amount of hair loss would be less than most people experience.

Fortunately, as treatment options have continued to evolve in both variety and efficacy, so has an alternative for women and men seeking to minimize chemotherapy induced alopecia (hair loss). Baptist is excited to have partnered with Paxman cooling caps to be the first cancer center in Lexington to offer scalp cooling as a treatment option. While it does not guarantee 100% protection from hair loss, it has been shown to significantly increase the retention of hair for patients receiving chemotherapy. The process is relatively simple: the patient wears a cooling cap attached to a cooling machine immediately before, during, and after receiving their chemotherapy treatment.

While there are multiple scalp cooling options, Baptist partnered with Paxman because we believe their process is the most patient friendly due to its reliability, efficiency, and competitive cost. Additionally, Paxman works directly with each patient to provide as much financial and educational support as possible, and we have been very impressed with the program so far.

Unfortunately, as great of a product as Paxman is, at this point insurances do not reimburse for this treatment option. As a result, there are many patients who come to the cancer center who, coupled with the very expensive cost of cancer care, simply cannot afford to receive this treatment that everyone should have access to.

*Scalp cooling reduces the damage that chemotherapy causes to hair follicles. It does this by lowering the temperature of the scalp immediately before, during, and after chemotherapy. This in turn reduces blood flow to the area around the hair follicles, which may prevent or minimize hair loss.*



It is for this reason we have been very excited to partner with the Lexington Cancer Foundation to help patients have access to the Paxman caps. Because of the extreme generosity of LCF, we will be able to purchase the caps (approximately \$500 value) for each patient opting to receive the Paxman cooling cap. Additionally, because the patients will be receiving foundation support, Paxman has agreed to lower the price for these patients, so the number of patients receiving support will be significantly increased, possibly even doubled.

We are still in the early stages of utilizing this technology and are learning how to better educate and prepare our patients for using Paxman during their chemotherapy. Additionally, we are continuing to explore what types of chemotherapy treatments have the best response with these caps to maximize the efficacy of this treatment for our patients. We initially launched this with a smaller target population of patients (while still allowing for any patient who requested the resource to have access) to help us work through the process and ensure everything worked as we had hoped. We are now moving into phase 2 and expanding it to all of our eligible treatment patients. We are excited to see the response and the impact it will have on the quality of life of our patients.

Thank you so very much, Lexington Cancer Foundation, for partnering with us as we are continuing to provide the best care for our patients and eliminate as much unnecessary burdens on our patients as possible.

### ⌈ Corey Lee: My Story ⌋

August 18, 2017 was the worst day of my life. I was one week from my 37th birthday and had just been diagnosed with breast cancer. The next year of my life was so complex: moments of despair and hope along the way. I write to tell you about one of my small victories: keeping my hair through chemotherapy.

After meeting with surgeons and oncologists, I elected to have a double mastectomy. After surgery, I learned that the cancer was found early and that I was Stage 1, which was great news. However, the pathology showed that I had an aggressive form of breast cancer and that I needed chemotherapy in order to decrease my chances of recurrence.

To me, the scariest part of chemo was losing my hair. It was such a part of my identity. A fellow survivor told me about a possible way to keep my hair called “cold capping,” a little known, costly technology that worked by narrowing the blood vessels beneath the scalp and reducing the amount of chemotherapy that reaches the hair follicles. My cancer center knew nothing about cold capping and I soon learned that my Insurance wouldn’t pay for it. Regardless, my husband and I embarked on the emotional, expensive journey of cold capping. When it was all said and done, I’d kept over 90% of my hair.

I realize that beauty and resolve all comes from within. No experience teaches you that more than battling cancer. But, the “victory” of keeping my hair boosted my morale and spirit to keep fighting. The Lexington Cancer Foundation is now funding scalp cooling systems at numerous hospitals around the Bluegrass in an effort to give a better quality of life to men and women fighting cancer.
